A MESSAGE FROM DEACON RUST

Ordinary Time

As we have now celebrated the chief mysteries of Christ's passion, death, resurrection, and ascension, as well as the sending of the Holy Spirit on Pentecost Sunday, we have now entered into what is known as ordinary time in the liturgical year. The liturgical year that is celebrated by the Church is full of mysteries as it pertains to the life of Christ. So why is this time called *ordinary time*?

The struggle in which we can often find ourselves is the danger of believing that this sacred time is merely ordinary, with no special emphasis or theme. We can therefore fall into the trap of thinking that everything we are doing is redundant or repetitious, especially as we process through the *ordinary* liturgical year in numerical sequence, i.e. 9th Sunday or Ordinary Time, 10th Sunday of Ordinary Time, 11th Sunday of Ordinary Time, etc.

But there is a distinction that must be made between *redundancy* and *repetition*. *Redundancy* in the spiritual life can be likened to doing the same thing over and over again, with the intention of manipulating a different result each time that one does the same thing. *Repetition*, however develops our incorporation into the mystery of God Himself who is freely offered and freely given in Jesus Christ, the Second Person of the Holy Trinity. *Repetition*, therefore fosters the formation of our character with every full human virtue exemplified in Jesus Christ.

With this distinction in mind, we can begin to comprehend the mind of Holy Mother Church when she gives us this time to foster this sense of repetition in the ordinary cycle of Sundays in Ordinary Time. We can also think of the source of this word, *ordinary*, and discover that the word itself can be misleading. Ordinary, deriving from the Latin, *ordo/ordin-(al)*, indicates that the Sundays are not merely ordinary. Rather, they are ordinal, meaning numbered. And these Sundays are numbered as they proceed from the highest feasts of the year in the Paschal Triduum, the Easter Season, Ascensciontide, and Pentecost. Prior to the Second Vatican Council and as it is still celebrated in the Extraordinary Form of the Roman Rite, this Sunday is numbered in this way: *Dominica III Post Pentecosten*. In other words, the third Sunday after Pentecost. This gives us the sense that the Sundays are not disjointed or invented as means of being *ordinary* in contrast to the high Sundays that are celebrated. Rather, they flow from them and move forward.

This finally brings us to the economy of movement as it is found in the liturgical season in general and how it impacts us. As we celebrate the secular calendar, we experience a circular motion within the calendar itself. We can begin with Spring, move to the Summer then to Fall, finally to winter, only to rebegin with Spring. The motion is circular. The liturgical calendar is different. Although we experience the circular motion of the seasons in that we celebrate the same feasts on a yearly basis, the motion is not circular, but spiral. Hence, repetition. Repetition has to do with spiral motion as there is always forward growth and momentum in a spiral even as it circles again and again over similar words, patterns, ideas and themes. Redundancy enslaves us, as the seasons of spring, summer, fall, and winter do. Repetition liberates us for love as it calls us to move forward from the liturgical feasts that were just celebrated and grow in the love that we have experienced from the All-Holy Triune God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

The challenge that confronts us is this: how do we move forward in *ordinary time* and not let the season be anything but ordinary? This takes much effort and conscientiousness that can ultimately only come from a heart that loves the Lord. When we love someone, we are willing to experience things that are repetitious and not allow the repetitiveness to overcome us but to embolden us and to strengthen us. In the spiritual life, this takes place in the virtues, further aiding us in coming to know, love and serve the God who is the Creator, Redeemer, and Sanctifier.

Marriage One and Indissoluble

The formulation of Genesis 2:24 indicates that human beings, created as man and women, were created for unity. It also indicates



that precisely this unity, through which they become one flesh, has right from the beginning a character of union derived from a choice. We read: "A man leaves his father and mother and cleaves to his wife." If the man belongs "by nature" to his father and mother, by virtue of procreation, on the other hand, he cleaves by choice to his wife (or she to her husband).

The text of Genesis 2:24 defines this character of the conjugal bond with reference to the first man and the first woman. At the same time, it does so in the perspective of the whole earthly future of man. Therefore, in his time, Christ will appeal to that text, as equally relevant in his age. Formed in the image of God, also inasmuch as they form a true communion of persons, the first man and the first woman must constitute the beginning and the model of that communion for all men and women, who, in any period, are united so intimately as to be one flesh.

The body, which through its own masculinity or femininity right from the beginning helps both to find themselves in communion of persons, becomes, in a particular way, the constituent element of their union, when they become husband and wife. This takes place, however, through a mutual choice. This choice establishes the conjugal pact between persons, who become one flesh only on this basis....As the expression of self-determination, choice rests on the foundation of his selfconsciousness. Only on the basis of the structure peculiar to man is he "a body" and, through the body, also male and female. When they both unite so closely as to become one flesh, their conjugal union presupposes a mature consciousness of the body. In fact, it bears within it a particular consciousness of the meaning of that body in a mutual self-giving of the persons.
