Giving to Charity: Strategies to Ensure a Tax and Human Benefit Under the New Tax Law

The Tax Cuts and Jobs Act went into effect January 1, 2018 nearly doubling the standard deduction. The standard deduction for 2018 increases from \$12,700 to \$24,000 for couples filing jointly. The standard deduction is the amount taxpayers can subtract from income if they do not list "itemized" write-offs for mortgage interest, charitable donations, state taxes, and other deductions on Schedule A. As a result, a taxpayer's itemized deductions for 2018 will need to be greater than new standard-deduction amounts for the taxpayer to benefit from listing deductions separately. The Tax Policy Center expects fewer than 10% of taxpayers are expected to itemize deductions in the 2018 tax year, down from 30% in past years. Taxpayers must itemize deductions to get the tax benefits associated with charitable giving. This may at first seem challenging for the 30% who itemized deductions....

Fortunately, there are solutions!

<u>One option</u> is charitable stacking or lumping. For example, instead of giving \$5,000 per year over five years to a charity, you would give \$25,000 in one year, taking you above the new standard deduction and thus providing a tax benefit for your contribution. Of course, zero giving over the next four years may play havoc on your psyche! It may not be appropriate for everyone.

<u>A second, more viable option, is a Donor Advised Fund</u>. This uses the "stacking or lumping" strategy **and allows you to keep your annual contribution schedule**. For example, you can donate the \$25,000 to a Donor Advised Fund and receive the tax deduction in the year you make the contribution. The money is later directed to the charities of your choice allowing you to maintain the \$5,000 annual gifts. Charities, like us, prefer a more consistent flow of income.

A Donor Advised fund can be started with a simple application for as little as \$10,000, with subsequent contributions as little as \$500. You can even name your account – for example "The Smith Family Foundation" – and pass it on to your children and grandchildren so that your gift keeps on giving for generations to come. Funding can be with cash or even better, with appreciated securities. A Donor Advised Fund simplifies and increases your power of giving while it addresses your tax and financial needs. Donors are urged to consult their attorneys, accountants or tax advisors with respect to questions relating to the deductibility of various types of contributions to a Donor Advised Fund for federal and state tax purposes.






