

PARISH LIFE



"You Shall Be Like Gods"

This original temptation, outlined in the first reading, was a promise that what was right and what was wrong would be up to us; that we could write our own moral law. That's what the "tree of the knowledge of good and evil" meant, and why Adam and Eve couldn't eat from it. We are all called to know good from evil, but not to decide it. To think we decide it is the error of the "pro -choice" mindset. "It's all up to me and my choice, even if it means killing a baby." In the culture of life, on the other hand, we live in the freedom of the children of God. and pattern our lives on the obedience of Iesus that leads to life eternal.

...God is Lord of our choices, and that freedom is found in obedience. This strikes at the heart of the culture of death, which puts choice above life and holds that a choice is validated not so much by what is chosen as by the fact that it is being chosen.

...We are all called to know good from evil, but not to decide it. To think we decide it is the error of the "pro -choice" mindset. "It's all up to me and my choice, even if it means killing a baby."

The obedience of Jesus Christ, exemplified in the Gospel passage and identified in the second reading as the source of our redemption, is the foundation for the culture of life and the pattern for each believer to live that culture. Obedience does not mean a slavish following of rules. It means a free embrace of what is true and good - free because one is no longer swayed to do what is wrong despite one's best intentions.

In that sense, the Church, and the pro-life movement. are the true promoters and defenders of "freedom of choice," because they provide the grace and the tools to do what is right. The majority of the efforts of the pro-life movement are directed to providing alternatives to abortion, concrete help to enable people to choose what is right. ~ Priests for Life

YEAR 2023 PTPA - ST. JAMES HAITI COMMITTEE * UPDATE *

Sister Parish, St. Marc, St. Marc, Haiti

For our new Parishioners: The city of St. Marc is on the Eastern coast, approx. 60 miles north of Port Au Prince. Our St James parish twinning activity with St. Marc Parish has endured since 1991. Through the love, compassion and generosity of our St. James Parishioners during these past years many basic needs have been met; a water purification system, bathrooms for the church, a large generator, renovations of both St. Marc Church and their 18th century Rectory. We have lent support to a primary School, two Home Ec. Classes and helped build a Tech School. In 2021 we participated in the Food For The Poor "Matching Funds Program" to benefit St. Marc Parish.

Other assistance of major importance are salaries for catechists who take the Word of God to the many chapels of St. Marc. We helped provide a radio station where the rosary is said daily and St. Marc Parish can stay in contact with those whom the clergy can not physically reach but once a month. We were able to assist in the building of Barbe Chapel from a dirt floor & leaking roof structure to a decent place of worship and in the past years assisted in the building of one other chapel.

All Parishioners: We are eternally grateful for your monthly donations. Without them we could not continue to do God's work for our Haitian brothers and sisters, who are in dire need of our love and support now as much as ever, as the current situation in Haiti is grim. Fr. Venel, Pastor of St. Marc asks for our prayers. Father let us know of the need for serious roof repairs to the Tech. School. He is also in need of EDH clean energy batteries and solar panels, which will provide huge savings. The cost of fuel has increased 100%.

Note: Due to serious problems in Haiti and lack of a warehouse State side we were unable to ship the 103 boxes of items collected during our Lenten drive last year. Tragically, the situation in Haiti has not changed. PTPA has informed us, again, it is not safe to ship. Therefore, rather than accumulating more items to ship, at increasing cost, common sense tells us it is best to focus on Fr. Venel's needs list of Tech School Roof repair, Batteries & Solar Panal for the Parish, and most important feeding those in dire need. Father tells us the number that come to his door are many.

Our 2023 Lenten Appeal will focus on monetary donations, to be sent for the above mentioned needs. One exception is sewing materials, because these items can be stored and shipped in 2024. (Items already on hand, not newly bought) **Contact Lois Shinkle 270-317-3277 with donations of sewing items.**

Our Lenten Drive is from Feb. 22 to April 5. Donations can be made throughout the year by using the **Green** envelope provided by St. James Parish. Make checks to St. James Church, marked Haiti. All donations are greatly appreciated. Annual donations allow us to meet our quarterly commitment to St. Marc Parish, which fill basic needs of both the Parish and St. Marc Tech School throughout the year.

Pastor of St. Marc Parish, Fr. Health & Wellness Committee Article

Religious fasting has long been a part of our Judeo- Christian heritage. In the Old Testament, the discipline of fasting is mentioned over 70 times. Fasting was used to honor God, to show sorrow or remorse over sin or to pursue answers from God.

Down through the ages, the Church has promulgated the discipline of fasting and abstinence in both the East and the West. According to the more recent traditional rules of the Roman Catholic Church, the Law of Fasting forbade more than one full meal a day with a small amount of food in the morning and evening not equal to one meal for ages 21-59. The Law of Abstinence forbade the use of flesh meat and the juice thereof. Before 1966, Fast and abstinence days included all the weekdays of Lent, specifically the Wednesday of Holy Week and Holy Saturday before noon. (There were dispensations for the Labor classes and their families.) Throughout the year, fast and abstinence days included Ember days (Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday near the change of seasons 4 x year) as well as the vigils of Pentecost, Assumption, All Saints and Christmas. Additionally, there has been a Eucharistic fast in place since the third century, requiring fasting from midnight until reception of Holy Communion.

In 1966, Pope Paul VI issued a document, *Paenitemini*, which set new minimum requirements for fasting and abstinence for Ash Wednesday and Good Friday and abstinence for the Fridays of Lent and emphasized an inner spirit of conversion with voluntary acts of penance. The Eucharistic fast was also changed and subsequently reduced to one hour before reception of Holy Communion.

The concept of fasting is not unique to religion, though the reasoning for fasting may differ. As a medical practice, the ancient Greek physicians Hippocrates and Plutarch prescribed, "Instead of medicine, fast a day." Mark Twain proposed, "the average sick man can best be treated with total abstention from food for one or two days." Most have heard of the adage, "Feed a cold, starve a fever." Moreover, humans and other species have been designed to adapt to a limited food supply. However, our modern lifestyles have given us almost unlimited access to a food supply that would be astounding to our ancestors. It appears that along with that access, there has been an unfortunate rise in chronic diseases as well.

Though medical studies in the early 1900's showed fasting to be a viable treatment for disease, emerging science is taking a closer look at the benefits of fasting, more specifically, Intermittent Fasting (IF). There are several types of (IF) including Time Restricted Feeding (TRF) whereby fasting from calorie containing foods and drink is maintained for a certain number of hours and meals are taken in a specific window of time. 16 hours of fasting with an 8-hour window for eating is a popular choice (16:8). Alternate day fasting (ADF) usually involves a schedule of 5 days of regular caloric intake with 2 days of fasting (5:2). Alternate day modified fasting (ADMF) follows the 5:2 schedule with a light meal allowed (\sim 25% of usual intake) on fasting days. The Church Law of Fast and Abstinence is most like the ADMF. The Eucharistic fast of old could be comparable to the TRF.

There are in vitro, animal and now some human studies that demonstrate improvements in weight, diabetes, cardiovascular health, blood pressure, autoimmune and neurological disease states and show the potential to enhance chemotherapy effect in cancer treatment when undertaking such (IF) regimens. (IF) triggers changes the biochemistry of the body to allow cells time to reset, clean house and adapt to stress. (IF) allows the circadian clock network to harmonize. (IF) appears to be easier to maintain than daily caloric restriction and comes with the benefit of preserving metabolic rate and lean muscle mass.

It is interesting to note that whether following the traditional Laws of Fast and Abstinence (religious) or the more recently proposed 5:2 schedule (scientific), approximately 28% of the total days of the year would be part of the fasting time period.

(IF) whether TRF or ADF/ADMF, is safe for most people but not indicated for children, pregnant women, underweight or malnourished or the very old. Though an ongoing fasting regimen may be suitable to enhance treatment for various disease states it should be initiated in consultation with the primary care provider.


