XXIV Domingo Ordinario

Les doy un mandamiento nuevo, dice el Señor:
que se amen los unos a los otros, como yo los he amado.

Con el evangelio de hoy se pone punto final al discurso eclesiológico para esta comunidad y nos enseña a todos los cristianos aquello por lo que debemos ser reconocidos en el mundo. La parábola del "siervo despiadado" (es un poco contradictorio eso de ser siervo, y despiadado) es una genuina parábola de Jesús, acomodada por la teología de Mateo, que hace preguntar a Pedro, con objeto de dejar claro a los cristianos, que el perdón no tiene medida. El perdón cuantitativo es como una miseria; el perdón cualitativo, infinito, rompe todos los cantos de venganza, como el de Lamec (Gn 4,24). Setenta veces siete es un elemento enfático para decir que no hay que contar las veces que se ha de perdonar. Dios, desde luego, no lo hace.



La lectura de la parábola nos hará comprender sobradamente toda la significación de la misma; es tan clara, tan meridiana, que casi parece imposible, no solamente que alguien deje de entenderla, sino que alguien tenga una conducta semejante a la del siervo liberado un instante antes de su muerte por las súplicas ante su señor. Es desproporcionada la deuda del siervo con su señor, respecto de la de siervo a siervo (diez mil talentos, es una fortuna, en relación a cien denarios). Sabemos que en esta parábola, según la teología de Mateo, se quiere hablar de Dios y de cómo se compadece ante las súplicas de sus hijos. ¿Por qué? porque es tan misericordioso, perdonando algo equivalente a lo infinito, que parece casi imposible que un siervo pueda deberle tanto. Efectivamente, todo es desproporcionado en esta parábola, y por eso podemos hablar de la parábola de la "desproporción". Por medio está el verbo "elléin" = "tener piedad". Cuando la parábola llega a su fin, todo queda más claro que el agua. Es una parábola de perplejidades y nos muestra que los hombres somos más duros los unos con los otros que el mismo Dios. Es más normal que los reyes y los amos no tengan esa piedad (elléin) que muestra el rey de esta parábola con sus siervos. Es intencionada la elección de los personajes. En realidad, en la parábola se quiere poner el ejemplo del rey; ese es el personaje central, y no los siervos. Y ya, desde los Santos Padres, se ha visto que el rey quiere representar a Dios. El siervo despiadado se arrastra hasta lo inconcebible con tal de salvar su vida; es lógico. ¿No podría haber sido él un rey perdonando a alguien como él, a su compañero de fatigas y de deudas?

Los que están en la misma escala deberían ser más solidarios. Pero no es así en esta parábola. El núcleo de la misma es la dureza de corazón que revelamos frecuentemente en nuestras vidas. Y es una desgracia ser duros de corazón. Somos comprensivos con nosotros mismos, y así queremos y así exigimos que sea Dios con nosotros, pero no hacemos lo mismo con los otros hermanos. ¿Por qué? Porque somos tardos a la misericordia. Por eso, el famoso "olvido, pero no perdono" no es ni divino ni evangélico. Es, por el contrario, el empobrecimiento más grande del corazón y del alma humana, porque en ese caso, más sentido podía tener "perdono, pero no olvido", aunque tampoco sería, desde el punto de vista psicológico, una buena terapia para el ser humano. Lo mejor, no obstante, sería perdonar y olvidar, por este orden.

From Saint Teresa of Calcutta

“But I feel a great destroyer of peace today is abortion, because it is a direct war, a direct killing, direct murder by the mother herself. And we read in the scripture, for God says very clearly. “Even if a mother could forget her child, I will not forget you. I have carved you in the palm of My Hand.” We are carved in the palm of His Hand; so close to Him, that unborn child has been carved in the Hand of God. And that is what strikes me most, the beginning of that sentence, that even a mother could forget something impossible—but even if she could forget -- **“I will not forget you.”** And today the greatest destroyer of peace is abortion. And we who are standing here—our parents wanted us. We would not be here if our parents would do that to us.” – *Lecture upon receiving the Nobel Peace Prize, Oslo, Norway, Dec. 11, 1979.* <><

“None of us lives as his own master and none of us dies as his own master.” This assertion, and what follows it in today’s Second Reading, speak of the dominion of God over human life. This, of course, is the basis for the Church’s opposition to abortion and euthanasia, and any other kind of violence against human life. The “pro-choice” side chants, “My body, my life, my choice!” and the pro-euthanasia side chants also, “My death!” But this reading declares that Christ is Lord both of the living and the dead. When the Church defends life, she is not only defending the rights of the human person, but is also defending the rights of God himself, and his absolute dominion over human life.

It is that dominion which also is the basis for the mercy and forgiveness of which today’s First Reading, Psalm, and Gospel speak. God is over all, and therefore can have mercy on all. The first act of mercy is creation itself, and therefore, just as we are called to imitate God’s mercy by forgiving our neighbor, so are we called to imitate his mercy by protecting our neighbor’s life.

Moreover, these powerful readings about mercy...remind [us] about the forgiveness the Lord and the Church offer to those who have had abortions, and about our responsibility to welcome such individuals with tenderness and kindness, and never with harshness or judgment. ~ ***Priests for Life***

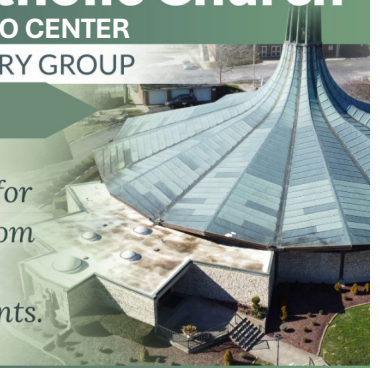

Agenda Overview and Prayer Requests - Lorna

Opening Prayer and Pastor's Notes - Father Michael: Personnel transitions: Laurie is doing great; Fabiola has taken over some of Dean's previous duties and that is going well. Dean assists with Mass on Sundays; Bill Clark has taken over assisting on Saturdays. People are now seeing Fr. Chuck more often and that has been well received. The Hispanic community will have another transition: We have two priests coming to the archdiocese. They are arriving earlier than planned, but very welcome. Fr. Michael is starting year 4, and this will be the 4th priest the Hispanic community has had during that time. They have been through many changes but are thriving.

Key Topics for Parish Pastoral Council -

Community Picnic overview and future of the picnic. Great turnout, very successful but haven't heard official numbers. The committee needs new blood because most members have been on for four years now and they would like more/new help. This event was previously driven by the school (Fall Festival). Required school parents to volunteer. The head of PTO used to run it, ask them to be more involved? About half of the proceeds from the picnic go to the school. Lou suggested seeing if committee chairs can work a booth or designate them to get volunteers.

Year of Parish Eucharistic Revival (June 2023 - July 2024) and 2024 National Eucharistic Congress (July 2024 in Indianapolis, IN). September 21st 6:30 in RTR is a parish info meeting regarding the Eucharistic Congress. The goal of the revival is to get Catholics reenergized about the Eucharist. It will have excellent speakers and a great component to offer fresh ideas on evangelization and how to approach people.

2024 Stewardship campaign: The stewardship committee is starting Sept. 14th to revise the booklet and get the new campaign rolling. The big question is if we should delay the start since the fiscal year doesn't start until July- instead of January roll out, should we do a big push in summer?

Finance discussions: Annual Accountability report is forthcoming. The focus is on getting teachers comparable pay to public school salary and to meet the needs of inflation. Profit down from previous year, but the need was so great to keep enrollment high and standard of education on par. Enrollment is 456 students. Tuition stayed the same, but since there was an increase in students, the cash flow will also increase. Security on the campus has received many enhancements. The school itself has room, but we face challenges seeing certain grade levels at capacity. Less students are leaving after fifth grade than before.

Additional Parish Pastoral Council Chair Reports

Faith Formation - Lou Olivia Dvorjak's Report: HSYM Confirmation: 26 candidates, 48 registered for HSYM. More likely to come because some aren't registered yet. Spiritual Apologetics study with 15 students in it. Also has a young adult group with most participants in their 20s. 9th grade retreat will be on Sept 23rd and 26 students will attend. Sr. Augusta's Report: FFF is underway with 34 families registered. OCIA has changed to a year-round program and 10 people have continued to meet across the summer. A new class will begin Sept 18 with those

candidates entering the church on Easter 2025. There is an OCIA for children as well- 10 children are registered. Sr. Augusta and Dean Sears have a study going-Unlocking the Mystery of the Bible: two sessions weekly. 21 and 12 people registered. Fraternus, a group led by Jamie Hobbs for boys and men has kicked off.

Parish Life - Cheri Coffee and doughnuts didn't show up this past weekend. The program may need to be restructured or reorganized. Seeds of Kindness is going well and will let us know if anything additional is needed. Bereavement committee served 7 meals in June, July, and August. They are believed to have served around 700 people. They have a great process for getting set up, cleaned up, volunteers, and what to do with leftover food. Linda Bacher is willing to assist with more social events- this could be a good time to partner them with Coffee and Doughnuts. The cultural diversity ministry is looking to meet with other groups to offer more dinners or exposure to different cultures. They have two big events they plan to continue: a day of reflection and a rosary event. They will also help with Epiphany Mass. St. James Playgroup has lost their chairperson. They are looking for someone to take over. The widowed friends group continues to meet, but attendance is low. They are hoping it will pick up because they enjoy the company. The picnic committee is working on post-picnic reflections and final numbers. They are hoping to turn over key positions to someone new. It was originally set up to have it turned over every two years. The health and wellness committee is small but mighty. They stay busy and were able to provide first aid services at the picnic. They host Zumba classes and meet monthly. Special thanks to them for their showing of a documentary and reflection from Mimi Pike.

School Board - Father Michael School board met. When it comes to school, there is lots of stability among staff. Jeff Lanz is off to a good start as librarian and seems to be enjoying it. The new PE teacher is also doing well and is well received by the students. Thanksgiving break will be shorter as school in session the Monday and Tuesday of Thanksgiving week.

Stewardship and Administration - Lorna Linda Brown will be working on the church directory. She is working on finding a vendor and planning on doing a summer photo session to accommodate families that might have students away at school during the school year.

Social Concerns - Jordan Haiti: No shipping in sight- the gang violence is controlling the country. The latest from Father Venel is because of gang control, the teachers can't get to the Tech school - supplies are hard to get - no one is safe. Father Venel is asking for financial help but stresses the extreme need for prayer. *SVdP Outreach:* They are making a change to their operational days due to lack of volunteers and partner agencies closing early on Fridays. They will change to Monday through Thursday from 10am to 2pm effective 1 Aug. Mr. Roush also stresses the need for volunteers. *Sick and Homebound:* Per Deacon Karl, things are going okay, but he is looking for someone to take over *Thanksgiving:* first meeting is in October. *Jail Ministry:* things are going well. Teams go about twice a month. It's a great ministry and very rewarding to see these guys respond so positively to Jesus Christ. We have several inmates come and talk to us every time we go, and several have come back multiple times. Would like to see more volunteers or be able to get a group to go once a week.

Worship - Jeff: Pleased with picnic Mass in school gym, it worked very well. A Eucharistic Ministers training refresher will be offered in October. The K of C will be taking servers to a putt-putt golf outing soon. Adjustments will be made to the TV ministry regarding audio and video.

Please plan to attend and invite your friends to as well.

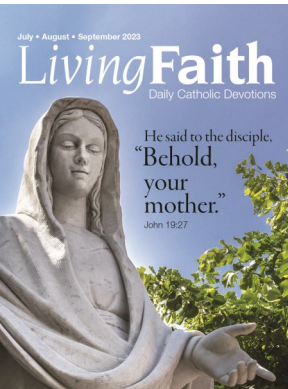
